Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. Freedom has adopted a comprehensive School Safety Plan that is reviewed and updated annually by members of our staff and the School Site Council. The Safety Plan is reviewed with staff members at the beginning of each school year with particular attention paid to emergency situations and staff and student responses. The school staff suggested final changes and had input on new assignments at the 9/26/22 staff meeting. The Site Council is comprised of teachers, classified staff, parents, and the principal. The Safety Plan for the 2022-2023 school year was formally approved by the school's School Site Council on 9/20/22. The revised Safety Plans are presented to the Sylvan Union School District Board of Trustees for annual review and approval. Safety drills, including fire, earthquake, and lockdown procedures, are held regularly. In addition, the school is inspected annually by the fire marshal and daily by the custodian. All issues discovered during these inspections are given the utmost priority. Copies of the comprehensive School Safety Plan are posted in each classroom and office area.
